Places at the Sunday Mass will be by a ballot. If you wish to enter the ballot please contact Jane by either by telephone (01724 711434) or email (jane.sarsfield@talk21.com) or Text message indicating how many seats you would like to reserve giving a name and contact details, any time **from Monday 12th July to Wednesday 14th July**. You will be contacted on Thursday with the outcome. Only those whose names are drawn in the ballot can be admitted, and there will be a reserve list in case someone drops out.

Please do not just turn up unless you have been advised of a place at Mass.

To be followed at all Masses:

Social distancing is set at 2m please observe this as you arrive and leave church. **When you arrive at church** please wait until invited to take a seat. Stewards will assist in arriving and leaving church so that people are kept safe. Those from different households must not share a pew unless they are in a support bubble.

People must not mingle with anyone not in their own household or support bubble, either inside or outside, and should move on promptly on leaving church.

Face masks must be worn.

Candles should be pre-booked, and they will be lit by the stewards.



15th Sunday in Ordinary Time (B) (Sea Sunday)

First Reading:

Amos 7:12-15

Amaziah, the priest of Bethel, said to Amos: Go away, seer; get back to the land of Judah; earn your bread there, do your prophesying there. We want no more prophesying in Bethel; this is the royal sanctuary, the national temple. I was no prophet, neither did I belong to any of the brotherhoods of prophets, Amos replied to Amaziah. I was a shepherd, and looked after sycamores: but it was the Lord who took me from herding the flock, and the Lord who said, Go prophesy to my people Israel.

Second Reading:

Ephesians 1:3-14

Blessed be God the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who has blessed us with all the spiritual blessings of heaven in Christ. Before the world was made, he chose us, chose us in Christ, to be holy and spotless, and to live through love in his presence, determining that we should become his adopted sons, through Jesus Christ, for his own kind purposes, to make us praise the glory of his grace, his free gift to us in the Beloved, in whom, through his blood, we gain our freedom, the forgiveness of our sins. Such is the richness of the grace which he has showered on us in all wisdom and insight. He has let us know the mystery of his purpose, the hidden plan he so kindly made in Christ from the beginning to act upon when the times had run their course to the end: that he would bring everything together under Christ, as head, everything in the heavens and everything on earth. And it is in him that we were claimed as God's own, chosen from the beginning, under the predetermined plan of the one who guides all things as he decides by his own will; chosen to be, for his greater glory, the people who would put their hopes in Christ before he came. Now you too, in him, have heard the message of the truth and the good news of your salvation, and have believed it: and you too have been stamped with the seal of the Holy Spirit of the Promise, the pledge of our inheritance which brings freedom for those whom God has taken for his own, to make his glory praised.

Mark 6:7-13

Jesus summoned the Twelve and began to send them out in pairs giving them authority over the unclean spirits. And he instructed them to take nothing for the journey except a staff - no bread, no haversack, no coppers for their purses. They were to wear sandals but, he added, 'Do not take a spare tunic.' And he said to them, 'If you enter a house anywhere, stay there until you leave the district. And if any place does not welcome you and people refuse to listen to you, as you walk away shake off the dust from under your feet as a sign to them.' So they set off to preach repentance; and they cast out many devils, and anointed many sick people with oil and cured them.

Extract taken from Fr Andrew's recent email:

As you know, on Monday evening Her Majesty's Government announced more details about Step 4, the final stage of the roadmap out of lockdown, which is expected to start on 19th July 2021, although that date will be confirmed next week. Speaking in the House of Commons, the Secretary of State for Health and Social Care said that in Step 4: 'It will no longer be a legal requirement to wear face coverings in any setting, including public transport, although we will advise this as a voluntary measure for crowded and enclosed spaces. It will no longer be necessary to work from home. There will be no limits on the number of people we can meet. There will no limits on the number of people who can attend life events such as weddings and funerals, and there will be no restrictions on communal worship or singing.' This is great news for all of us here in England – if you are reading this email in Wales, Scotland, Northern Ireland or elsewhere, please follow the laws and guidance in force in your own country. However, we would be mistaken if we were to think that the pandemic At the time of writing, there are 602 cases per 100,000 people in North East Lincolnshire in the week ending 1st July 2021, and the rate of infection for those aged 0-59 seems to be rising exponentially. The average area in England had 181, in West Lindsey it is 148 per 100,000 people, in North Lincolnshire it is 186.9% per 100,000. So, we must continue to keep doing the best we can to keep ourselves and others safe. We will, of course, have to await further guidance from the Bishops' Conference of England and Wales as to how this easing will be implemented in our churches and other properties; in the meantime, we must carry on booking for Sunday Mass, wearing our face coverings, which remains a legal requirement, and maintaining 1m+ social distancing, so that our churches continue to be as safe and welcoming as they have been since they reopened The Government has said that, from Step 4, people will be enabled to make informed decisions about how to manage the risk to themselves and others. The Government will provide guidance to the public and to businesses on how they can help reduce the spread of Covid-19 and mitigate the risk of a resurgence which puts the NHS under unsustainable pressure. We will all be asked to make informed choices and to weigh up the risks to ourselves and others. We will continue to ensure that our churches and other properties remain safe and welcoming, particularly to those who have been unable to come for some time and who may be feeling quite nervous; in particular, many of us may wish to continue using our face coverings, and indeed we should do because our face coverings remind us that others' health is more important to us than our own comfort, and also maintain social distancing, and we will accommodate as many people as we can .

The second Sunday in July, is when we come together across the globe to celebrate the role seafarers play in our daily lives. To thank them for the hardships they face and the sacrifices they have been forced to endure due to the Covid lockdowns.

Today is Sea Sunday, when the Church prays for all those who live and work at sea. Today's second collection is for Stella Maris (Apostleship of the Sea), the Catholic Church's official maritime welfare agency. It supports seafarers both practically and spiritually. Reflection: 90% of world trade is transported to the world's markets by ship, the ships are crewed by seafarers of all nations. Today a total of 1.5 million seafarers are involved in crewing over 50,000 ocean going vessels. On this Sea Sunday we pray for the work of all seafarers, for those who face many dangers, guiding their ships through storm and strong seas, through other dangers such as piracy off the East coast of Africa and the Indian Ocean. Often facing times of loneliness and isolation, being far away from home and family, without the things that we today take for granted such as internet and cheap phone calls home.

Prayer: Almighty God, you who calm the restless waves, bring your children who sail the seas safely into port, protecting them from all the dangers of the deep. And comfort their families who wait for their safe return. Amen.
